**Dear Sir/Madam,**

The Oriental Institute, The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, Vadodara invites original innovative unpublished articles on Indological Studies: Veda, Purāṇa, Itihāsa, Literature (Sanskrit), Archaeology, Iconography, ancient Indian sciences, Philosophy and Unpublished manuscripts. Since you are a scholar of your concerned field, we would like you to send an article on any of the above mentioned sections for our forthcoming **72<sup>nd</sup> Volume** of the Journal (proposed to be published next year).

#### **Guidelines:**

1. Articles should be only in English with ample margin; the Contributor should write only his name (no adjective or designation) at the right side below the Title. Down at the end of first page in Foot-notes, should mention his official postal address with Mobile No. and E-mail ID.
2. In the article, for English language, Font name -**Times New Roman**, size 12 (Heading 16, subtitles 14 in Bold), Foot-note font size 10, for *Devanāgarī* (Sanskrit) in **Unicode** Font, Size 12.

3. The **Titles of Sanskrit/Non-Sanskrit works** in transliteration should be in *Italics* while printing (should be dictated by underlining the word if not done by the author) with proper diacritical marks e.g. *Ṛgveda*, *Śvetāśvara Upaniṣad*, *Rāmāyaṇa*, *History of Sanskrit Poetics*, *Rāmacarita-mānasa* etc.
4. The names of certain **General classes of works** in transliteration should **not be in italics** e.g. Vedas, Upaniṣads, Purāṇas, Upapurāṇas, Mahātmya, Itihāsa, Nyāya, Kośa (but with diacritical marks).
5. But the names of **certain classes of works** in transliteration should **be in Italics** except last 's' showing plurality, e.g. *Jātakas* etc.
6. **Abbreviations of the titles of Sanskrit works** should **not be in Italics**, e.g. RV (for *Ṛgveda*), SV (*Sāmaveda*), YV (*Yajurveda*), AV (*Atharvaveda*), Mbh (*Mahābhārata*), BG (*Bhagavad Gītā*), NS (*Nāṭyaśāstra*) (or any other Abb. created for any Sanskrit works).
7. **Proper names** in transliteration, **should not be in Italics** e.g. Rāma, Sītā, Bhāsa, Kālidāsa, Bhavabhuti, Indra, Agni, Śiva, Umā, Durgā, Rudra, Kṛṣṇa, Gaṅgā, Yamunā etc. and the **names of places** e.g. Prayāga, Mathurā, Bhārata, Mithilā (but with diacritical marks).
8. **Epithets** (adjectives) in transliteration should **be in Italics** e.g. *Paulasatya*, *Kārtavīrya*, *Cakravartī*, *Siddharāja*, *Prajāpati* (in general sense).
9. In the body of the 'article', Non-English **stray words must be** written in transliteration (Roman), **in Italics** and with proper **diacritical marks but Sanskrit/Prakrit lines/ verses** must be written in *Devanāgarī*.
- 10. The Sanskrit quotations (verses/ślokas) if quoted in quarter/half/full line in text body or Foot-notes, References - should be in 'Devanāgarī script' (not Roman).**
12. Whenever an Abbreviation is used in an article, its full form should be stated in first occurrence and then that abridged form may be used for that full form in all over the article.
13. **All references cited in the article must appear in the 'References' not in 'Foot Notes'**, should appear at the end of the article. Include the title '**References**' (in middle space) which will be added at the end of the Article. Special notes or 'glossaries' can be added on respective pages in **Foot Notes** with asterisk mark (\*) or if required with running numbers throughout the article.

Since The Journal of Oriental Institute is an Inter-national Journal, the editorial board has decided to follow the general guidelines for formatting **Reference List** entries for Journal articles in Chicago Style (can be seen on Chicago Manual of Style -CMOS). Kindly note-

A List of References (alphabetically arranged) shows only the sources you refer to in your writing. The purpose of reference list is to allow your sources to be found by your reader.

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There should not be long quotations/narrations of other authors for supporting your view in the text body since the article is written by you, not them.

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**For example -**

**Book’s reference:** Patel Partha 1993. *The Nation and its Fragments: Colonial and Post-colonial Histories*, New Jersey: Princeton University Press, 10-15

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15. The research articles should be submitted on A-4 size paper (typed on one side) addressed to :

15. The Article should be supported by the ‘**Abstract**’ of the paper and ‘**Key words**’ used in the article (the article should start with them only).
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20. **The last date for submitting articles is November 30, 2022.**

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
